

Australians and when approached with careful consideration and thoughtful design, school camp can bring out the best in your students.




VARIETY IS THE SPICE OF EDUCATION

It can be tempting when you see a camp's range of educational adventures to pack your experience full of fun-filled activities for your students.

Remember to allow your students the time to enjoy the outdoors in a relaxed manner, enabling them to build on friendships and discover different forms of engagement in new surroundings.

It is also important to make space for reflection and discussion time. Because each learner is unique, programming should allow for peaks, valleys, turbulence, excitement, periods of calm, and periods of activity. It is ideal for students and staff to move through a sequence of outcomebased activities, prefaced with a briefing and concluded with a debrief aimed toward self-reflection and the recognition of one's own capabilities.

A Consider how you will cater to all personality and learning types by including a varied selection of activities; teamwork and solo activities, fun on land, water, or the sky allow each individual to shine. When your provider shares the camp outline with you, check it for the elements of variety you have decided are important.





Camp providers can plan, design and deliver school camp programs in partnership with your school. Consider a long-term educational strategy and the development of your students.

A school camp can certainly be a standalone experience. However, it can also be part of a sequential program. Sequential experiences introduce students to varying and age-appropriate adventures and activities, enabling growth and development from one year to the next. Sequential programs can mean your students can return for yearly visits to the same sites and have a very different experience while building on their previous experiences.

▲ Request information about sequential programs from your provider and speak to your team about a continuing and long-term solution to student development.

CONSIDER THE TEACHER EXPERIENCE


A teacher or teachers will accompany your cohort; they are a necessary part of the student's experience away from school.

But just because they are attending a school camp for students does not mean they should be forgotten. Teachers make a significant personal contribution of their time in going away to school camp and your provider should recognise this.

Dedicated suitable accommodation with private facilities should be provided. Some providers will offer 100% facilitated sessions, allowing the teacher's role to become supportive rather than active.

At other points of the program, it will be essential for teachers to be involved and hands-on because this is the best way to embed learning and take it back to school. Negotiating breaks between group leaders and teachers will help ensure everyone has their much-needed downtime and that little bit of opportunity for self-care and self-reflection.

▲ Don't forget, camps are often set in beautiful surroundings; this exposure to nature has restorative effects not only for your students but your teachers as well, giving them a break from their busy day-to-day.





What type of experience will help you best achieve your objectives? If you've had previous experiences with a school camp provider, begin by making a list of the pros and cons of their services. If you've not had any prior experience, create a list of your must-haves. This step will best prepare you for your initial conversation with new providers.

Camp providers will often offer a variety of camp experiences, from single-day experiences, overnight stays to multi-day camps. An extended experience will allow your students to become more comfortable with their surroundings and fully engage in the experience. A single-day experience is an excellent way to introduce your students to all camp has to offer.

Accommodation is another consideration. Tented accommodation offers an immersive experience, while

hard-top cabins provide comfort and less preparation. Perhaps a mix of both suits your objectives, giving your students a varied and memorable experience.

Is your camp's location important, remembering it will determine the distance you must travel? Consider how you will travel to your destination and what time you will need to leave school for arrival at the camp.

Most providers will offer a fully catered experience. Your provider may even provide an opportunity for students to get involved in the food-making process. With produce grown on-site or sourced locally, consider giving your students the hands-on experience of preparing some of their own meals.

An experienced camp provider will work closely with you and your school to achieve your ideal camp.


TAKE A TOUR

Consider booking a site tour. Many camp providers will even accommodate an on-site tour while another program is attending their camp to give you a better understanding of how your camp may run.

A tour will allow you to look over the accommodation, the dining facilities, the grounds and acquaint yourself with the site's activities. A tour also gives you the opportunity to meet some of the key staff.

It provides you with confidence in the knowledge you have selected a great venue that meets your needs, is safe and offers exciting opportunities for your students.

▲ If you aren't making the decision on your own, visiting the site with your team is an excellent opportunity to better inform your collective understanding.





As chief liaison to your provider, it will be your responsibility to make sure your parent body, student body and other relevant school leaders are well prepared for the experience. A practised camp provider will be committed to ensuring you have all the right information for all parties involved.

Consider how you will disseminate relevant information to those who require it. Emails to parents are convenient as they can be comprehensive and used as a reference later. Remember to keep these lines of communication open, so parents know where to go if they have questions. For extended programs, emails paired with parent briefings may be more effective in providing context. Briefings and emails are recommended internally; this will allow staff to familiarise themselves with the program and the organisation. Briefings with your student body are vital and provide a space for them to ask questions.

▲ This approach is designed to inform and alleviate concern in all parties and demystify the camp experience for students and your parent body.


TAKE SAFETY SERIOUSLY

Your camp provider will work to ensure students are fully supported while on program. Student medical profiles should be collected for all clients and participants to ensure adequate support of participants on program and support informed consent in an instance requiring urgent medical attention.

Many camps will provide an on-site 24-hour contact person for your teachers and groups – they work to support the program's staff and students. They monitor environmental conditions and liaise with the group twice a day. They provide support in the event of

medical needs and for those with preexisting conditions or injuries needing medical attention – often transporting students along with a teacher to the local medical facility.

Camps should provide a Field Duty
Manager who is on call 24-hours a day; this
person monitors weather conditions, fire
ratings and activities and provides support
to all groups in the field at any given time.
The Field Duty Manager coordinates any
incident response needed and becomes
the liaison with schools in more emergent
situations – allowing staff on the ground to
focus on those in their care.
